



Quantitative Research 2

Paper overview

This paper provides the students with the skills to analyse and synthesise quantitative methodologies and statistical data analysis procedures; and to develop a research proposal that will scientifically evaluate discipline specific health care practices. This paper is suitable for people who are involved in health related disciplines, are interested in advancing their skills in quantitative research methods and data analysis, and planning on completing a masters degree by thesis that will use quantitative research methods.

Programme study options

This paper is offered through the Faculty of Health and Environmental Sciences and is a common core research paper for students, who wish to develop a quantitative research proposal suitable for a masters thesis, and are enrolled in either a post-graduate diploma or a masters degree both in the health sciences area. A pre- and/or co-requisite to this paper is Quantitative Research 1, 589121.

Who can study this paper?

This paper caters for people from a variety of health and health related professions, such as physiotherapists, occupational therapists, podiatrists, nurses, sport and exercise practitioners, physiologists, doctors, osteopaths, oral health professionals, psychologists, and social workers.

What you can expect to learn

This paper covers the following topics:

- Developing a research question and purpose
- Writing hypotheses
- Reviewing quantitative research, systematic reviews, and narrative reviews
- Application of research designs and methods
- Statistical data analysis methods
- Research funding
- Developing and writing a research proposal

What you need to study this paper

To study this paper it is essential you have a computer, internet (broadband preferred), email access and that your computer is set up so that you can have access to Blackboard.

We also expect students to have an understanding and knowledge of quantitative research methods and statistics equivalent to that acquired in an undergraduate degree and that this knowledge is health related. If you have not undertaken a research paper at undergraduate level or not studied one for some time, you should complete the online Health Research paper, which is offered monthly through the Faculty of Health and Environmental Sciences, and will update your research skills, and familiarise you with the research terminology.

Quantitative Research 2

Dates and location details

Location: Semester 1, on campus at Akoranga Campus, AUT University, and Semester 2 online.

Teaching Period(s): This paper is offered twice a year. In Semester 1 (27th February to 22nd June 2012). In Semester 1, it is an on campus version, with Blackboard discussion forums. In Semester 2 (16th July to 9th November, 2012) the paper is taught solely online through Blackboard.

Block Course: Yes Semester 1

Dates: On campus teaching block is Wednesday mid-day 14th March 2012 to Friday 16 March 2012

Teaching style: Interactive lectures, tutorials and computer laboratories.

How will the paper be taught?

For both the on campus and online versions of the paper, we use a variety of teaching and learning techniques, which are primarily problem based learning, with information being delivered in an interactive manner by way of lectures, tutorials, computer laboratories, on-line discussion forums, and one-to-one discussion with students. As this is a postgraduate paper, we expect students to work in an independent manner, which for some students will be a new experience, and therefore our emphasis is upon building a mutually supportive, respectful community of learners. Our role will be as facilitators rather than teachers. We have our own personal and professional experience to bring to the programme, but our role is to create an environment where we can all learn from each other.

How much time will I need to commit to the paper?

This is dependent on your other commitments and the speed at which you learn and work, but on average a 15 point paper typically involves around 8 to 10 hours per week of independent study.

How will the paper be assessed?

There are two modes of assessment:

1. An optional formative 500 word written assignment.
2. A summative written assignment consisting of questions that address quantitative research methods, statistical analysis and critiquing of quantitative research. This assignment has a maximum of 5000 words.

How much does this paper cost?

15 point paper tuition fees for domestic students in 2012 is approximately NZ\$1000. Additional fees for study may include; a learner services levy, student association (AUSM) fee, charges and paper activity fees.
