Am I eligible to enrol in this course?

The paper is for health professionals who will normally have completed the requirements of one of the following in a relevant field from a New Zealand tertiary institution or equivalent:

- A bachelor's degree
- Professional qualification recognised by the university as being equivalent to a bachelor's degree
- Evidence of professional experience deemed by the university to be equivalent to a bachelor's degree

Where entry qualifications do not meet the criteria for study at postgraduate level, completion of transitional studies may be required before the applicant is admitted to the programme.

What is this course about?

This paper focuses on engagement in rehabilitation. It prompts students to explore factors that impact on adaptation to illness and impairment and patient engagement. We consider how clinicians, services, and organisations impact on engagement, and how these respond to and are experienced by Māori and diverse populations. We explore a range of concepts, theories and evidence that can help clinicians make sense of engagement-related issues, and examine different strategies and approaches which can support engagement. Students are encouraged to identify practical strategies and apply these within their own practice.

What can I expect to learn?

- Psychological consequences of illness, injury or disability
- Factors influencing engagement in rehabilitation, including Māori and diversity perspectives
- Client, practitioner, organisational and structural influences and barriers in engagement
- Theoretical models relevant in understanding and facilitating engagement
- Evidence-based strategies to support engagement
