WELCOME TO
AUT RESEARCH WEEK /
TE WIKI RANGAHAU 2025



In setting the theme for this year's Te Wiki Rangahau / AUT Research Week, I thought about what unites AUT researchers. We are a diverse institution, with 16 academic schools across five faculties, plus multiple research institutes and networks. Our researchers investigate everything from clean energy to cephalopod ecology; from virtual reality to biomedical technology. But one unifying theme stands out: our research makes a difference.

AUT research influences our communities and economies, our built and natural environments, our whānau and our culture. And so when we invited our researchers to speak on the theme of Research that Makes a Difference, they embraced the theme with enthusiasm. As a result, this year's AUT Research Week features a programme of no less than 30 events celebrating the practical impact of AUT's research and highlighting the many ways in which it changes the world around us.

Our opening and closing events feature two of AUT's award-winning researchers. Professor Alice Theadom, winner of the 2024 AUT Te Huihuinga o Matariki Research Excellence Award, will speak at our opening event. Professor Theadom is a world-leading researcher in the field of traumatic brain injury, and director of the Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI) Network. Her research ethos is deeply collaborative; and she joins us to discuss how she has leveraged connections and partnerships to make a difference for patients with TBI.

Similarly, Associate Professor Shahab Ramhormozian, winner of the 2024 AUT Tupu-ā-nuku Early Career Researcher Award, places partnerships at the centre of his research. Associate Professor Ramhormozian works to improve buildings' earthquake-readiness. His collaborations across both academia and industry have enhanced seismic resilience in very practical ways in Aotearoa and beyond. He joins us for the closing event to reflect on how his research and practice has contributed to our collective safety in the earthquake-prone Pacific Rim.

In between these opening and closing events, there are numerous opportunities to learn about our research that has truly made a difference. For example, hear how the LitPlus research group has shown that reading for pleasure in early life – and encouraging reading for pleasure in our communities and education system – can set children up

for long-term success. Learn about the Pacific Tourism Data Initiative, which has been collecting data to inform decision-making in the Pacific tourism sector for over a decade. Hear how kaupapa Māori research has been applied in business, economics and law to revitalise and decolonise practices in these crucial areas.

For those wishing to improve their own research capability, we have workshops galore. Whether you want to learn how to create short videos for social media, make (responsible) use of generative AI tools in your research, refine the way you manage your research data or get advice on your research ethics application – there are plenty of learning opportunities throughout the week.

This week also affords an opportunity to celebrate the launch of three new AUT research networks: the AUT Regenerative Environment Network, the Toi o te Ora AUT Wellbeing Research Network, and the AUT Transformational Technologies Research Network. These networks bring together researchers from diverse backgrounds to develop and implement transdisciplinary approaches to local, national and global research issues, and in doing so to make a difference.

We are delighted this year to bring the popular Ngā hua a Tāne-te-wānanga Māori Research Symposium to audiences in te reo Māori for the first time (with simultaneous English translation). This important step recognises the fact that our language shapes our thinking, and Māori research and knowledge, impacting Māori communities, is best expressed in te reo Māori. Ko tōku reo tōku ohooho, ko tōku reo tōku māpihi maurea. My language is my awakening, my language is the window to my soul.

I invite you to join us for these and other exciting events in the 2025 Te Wiki Rangahau / AUT Research Week programme.

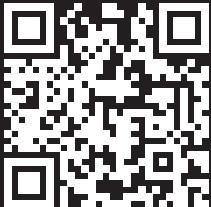

Kaupapa Māori Research: Paradigm and Practice in Business, Economics and Law

Māori scholars will present research and insights into Kaupapa Māori as a research paradigm informing theory and practice for social change. Professor Ella Henry will lead a discussion on the evolution of Kaupapa Māori as an ontology, epistemology, axiology and methodology, a research paradigm underpinned by aspirations for cultural revitalisation. Sophie Coomber uses decolonised methodologies to find legal solutions in tikanga and asks how those solutions can be translated to law. Dr Jack Barrett, who focuses on community-led projects, economic transformation, and Indigenous-led projects, will share a study from Tai Rawhiti. Dr Megan Phillips focuses on Māori and the emerging literature on ethical and social marketing. There will also be a presentation by Donna Coventry and Alissa Hackett from Te Mātāpuna Library on Māori data sovereignty and local context licenses.

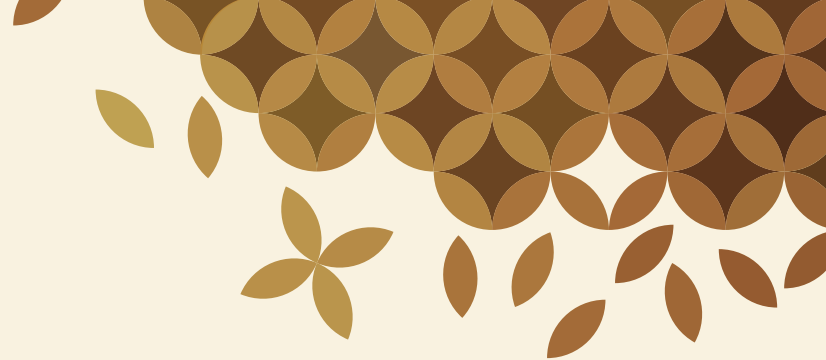

PUBLIC TRANSPORT OPTIONS

Travel between the North and City Campus

The NX2 bus offers convenient travel between the North and City Campus. The closest stop to the North campus is Akoranga station (stop 41382). From there, you can follow the pedestrian path to the Campus – a ~5 minute walk. The closest stop to the City Campus is on Wellesley Street East (stop 7089).
