

City

At the University's biggest campus located in Auckland's CBD, students study architecture, business, communications, law, design, hospitality and tourism, economics, computer and mathematical sciences, language and culture, social sciences, engineering and science, amongst others. The campus offers a number of state-of-the-art buildings, including the Engineering, Computer and Mathematical Sciences building.



North

The North Campus, situated on Auckland's North Shore, is home to the University's health, teacher education and sport and recreation programmes, and includes the AUT Integrated Health community clinics on Akoranga Drive. The clinics offer services across oral health, occupational therapy, podiatry, counselling psychology, psychotherapy, nursing, and physiotherapy.



South

Located in Manukau, the South Campus provides undergraduate and postgraduate programmes in education, business, computer and information sciences, design, health science, sport and recreation, and law. The campus is also a hub for community engagement and events. The South Campus is the home of the award-winning Mana Hauora building.

THREE SPECIALIST FACILITIES

Warkworth Radio Astronomical Observatory

Located 70km north of Auckland, New Zealand's only radio astronomical observatory houses two radio telescopes maintained by AUT's Institute for Radio Astronomy and Space Research.



AUT Millennium

AUT Millennium, located in Mairangi Bay, is a high-performance sports development and sports research centre, which aims to help the community be healthy and New Zealand's top athletes to excel.



AUT Centre for Refugee Education

Located in Mangere, the centre provides an on-arrival six-week education programme for the refugees who arrive in New Zealand each year under the government quota scheme.

AUT research benefits all New Zealanders and addresses issues facing the environment and society. Our discoveries are widely used, both in New Zealand and around the world. Our research also feeds back into the classroom, and students can contribute to and learn from these research discoveries.

An innovative teaching and learning environment

AUT's three university campuses feature modern buildings that don't just win architecture awards but also provide excellent collaborative environments where students can develop skills that help them stand out in their future careers.



We have a number of world-class facilities including one of only a handful of motion capture studios in the country; New Zealand's top sports science facility, AUT Millennium; and the country's only two major radio telescopes, which are involved in projects with international research partners.

Our state-of-the-art buildings were created using sustainable principles and feature inviting and functional learning areas, lecture theatres, auditoriums and research spaces. This includes the Engineering, Computer and Mathematical Sciences building, which has unique design features that mean it can be used as a teaching tool and 'living lab' where students can get hands-on experience.

World-leading academic staff


Our academic staff are research-active and at the forefront of their disciplines. They are frequently awarded prestigious research grants and fellowships, and are sought after for their expertise as postgraduate supervisors. Many of them are internationally known as experts in their fields, and organisations around the world draw on their expertise for key projects.

For example, Professor Gail Pacheco's research is used by the Government to address the gender

pay gap, Associate Professor Felicity Lamm is the Government's chief advisor for health and safety, and Professor Tim Maloney has been appointed as the chief economist at the Ministry of Social Development.

Professor Rhema Vaithianathan is globally recognised for using data science and machine learning tools for social good; implementing machine learning tools for child protection and other high stakes government systems.

Associate Professor Barbara Bollard's innovative use of drones to monitor remote ecosystems has caught the attention of scientists from NASA who recognise this approach could also help them find evidence of life on Mars.

Connections to the workplace




Gaining an edge on the competition

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PLANNING YOUR WEEK

Timetables can vary from programme to programme depending on what students are studying. Students generally take four courses each semester (each worth 15 credits). As well as attending lectures and tutorials, students also need to spend time studying the course material and working on assignments.

We strongly recommend that first-year students give themselves time to settle into university life before they take on part-time work.

All AUT campuses have plenty of spaces where students can work on assignments and study between classes, and students can also access AUT's excellent library facilities and computer labs.

To give you an idea what an average timetable may look like, here are some examples for different AUT degrees. Each student's timetable will depend on the courses they are studying that semester.

ASSESSMENTS AND EXAMS

Each course has assignments or exams to see how well students have understood the topics covered in the course. Students need to pass these to successfully pass the course. The number and type of assessments is different for each course.

Assessments and exams will often take place in the final weeks of the semester, so it's important that students manage their time well and are highly organised.

Here is an example of an assessment brief. This explains everything a student needs to know about an assessment – including when it's due, how much it's worth and what it will cover.

UNIVERSITY LINGO

Bachelor's degree

A bachelor's degree (or undergraduate degree) is the highest and most common programme of study students can enter directly from secondary school. Students need University Entrance to start a bachelor's degree. For most AUT students a bachelor's degree is the first university qualification they complete. Most bachelor's degrees take three years' of full-time study; some can take four to five years.

Certificate and diploma

Certificates and diplomas can serve as a pathway into a bachelor's degree. For example, the Diploma in Arts is a pathway into the Bachelor of Arts.

Conjoint programmes

A conjoint programme of study enables a student to study two degrees at the same time and complete both in a shorter time than it would take to complete them separately. This is because a number of courses can count towards both degrees. It's usually possible to complete two three-year degrees in four to five years. Students need to maintain a B grade average across all courses each year and do courses from each degree every year. Only some degrees can be studied as conjoint programmes. If your chosen degree combination is not available, you may be able to study double degrees.

Double degrees

To undertake double degrees, students need to apply and enrol separately in each of the two degrees. There may be some courses that can be cross-credited from one degree to the other, but this varies depending on degree combinations. If a student is considering a double degree, we highly recommend they contact AUT to discuss it further.

Major

A major is the subject area a student specialises in. For most bachelor's degrees, students don't have to know exactly what major they would like to specialise in when they start at AUT. For example, in AUT's Bachelor of Sport and Recreation, students get a taste of all the different majors in their first year, and in their second year they start to specialise in their chosen major(s).

A major normally makes up one third of a degree (120 points) and requires completing certain compulsory courses and other requirements. In many degrees, students can choose to study two majors and develop skills in two separate disciplines, as long as their timetable allows this. For some programmes choosing a major is optional and students can also study the degree without a major.

Mino

A minor is also a subject area a student can specialise in, but it's smaller than a major. In many degrees, students can choose to include a minor as part of their degree, as long as their timetable allows this. A minor consists of at least 60 points in a single subject area (a major consists of 120 points).

Phi

PhD is short for Doctor of Philosophy. A PhD is a globally recognised postgraduate degree awarded to candidates who have submitted a thesis or dissertation, based on extensive and original research in their chosen field. A PhD is usually the highest qualification awarded at a university.

Point:

Every course has a point value associated with it, which indicates its contribution to a qualification. A typical undergraduate bachelor's degree is worth 360 points. Most courses are worth 15 points each.

Postgraduate

This is the highest level of study at a university. To enrol in a postgraduate programme students generally need to have completed a bachelor's degree in a related field. Some postgraduate programmes are made up of courses students need to complete, while others include the opportunity to complete research in an area of interest. The Master of Philosophy and Doctor of Philosophy are research-only degrees – ideal for students who want to solely focus on their research project and not complete any courses.

Undergraduate

Generally, this is the first level of study a school leaver will do at university. A bachelor's degree is the most common form of undergraduate study.

Workplace experience

For many of our bachelor's degrees, the final part is a supervised work placement or a project for an organisation of the student's choice. It's a great chance for students to apply what they've learnt in the classroom and develop their skills. Employers value the fresh ideas and latest thinking our students bring to the organisation, and for many of our students the workplace experience also leads to a permanent role in their host organisation.



APPLICATION TIMELINE

This page gives you an idea of the different steps within the application process, and when they happen throughout the year.



Future student applies to AUT

Student receives acknowledgement email from AUT, confirming the application has been received

They will receive one of the following for each programme they applied for:

Provisional offer of place

You have met some of the entry criteria to your chosen programme and we would like to offer you a provisional place to study at AUT. This essentially means that we're 'saving your spot' in the programme as long as you achieve certain requirements in your final exams/ assessments (eg gaining University Entrance). If you don't meet the rest of the requirements then this offer will be withdrawn

Awaiting decision

Some popular programmes have limited places because of physical or other resource constraints, and rank applicants according to their academic achievement. Your UE results will be required before a final decision is made. High achieving applicants for popular programmes may be given a provisional offer

Decline/Referral

You don't meet the entry requirements or all places are taken. We may offer you an alternative programme (eg another bachelor's degree or a relevant certificate)



Future student's Year 13 results received

Students who previously received a provisional offer of place or are waiting for a decision will receive one of the following for each programme they applied for:

Confirmation of place

AUT will confirm your study for 2022

Decline/Referral

You don't meet the entry requirements or all places are taken. We may offer you an alternative programme (eg a relevant certificate)

TOP TIPS FOR APPLYING

To study at university, students need to meet the entry requirements for their chosen programme. For all bachelor's degrees, University Entrance (UE) is the minimum requirement all students need to meet. However, some programmes also have additional requirements, so it's important to check what is required for your chosen programme.

Check if a driver's license is required for your teen's chosen programme or if there are certain subjects needed or other requirements. Some AUT programmes – like the Bachelor of Engineering (Honours) – also use a rank score as part of their entry requirement process.

You can find what is required for your chosen programme in the relevant programme brochure or the AUT website.

Apply early

It's best to apply before Term 4. That way, students can focus on their end of year exams without worrying about the university application process.

Email address

Email is our main form of communication. This is a good time for students to create a more professional sounding email address, rather than using their school email address.

Back up plans

Applying isn't committing anyone to anything, so it's always good to have a plan A, B and C. Students can apply for up to five different programmes at AUT.



FEES & SCHOLARSHIPS

Fees

To give you an idea of approximate costs, the 2021 tuition fees are shown below (based on full-time study and completing 120 points per year). All fees are in NZ dollars and include GST. The 2022 tuition fees will be advertised on aut.ac.nz/fees as soon as they have been set.

Domestic student tuition fees

Undergraduate tuition fees can range from approximately \$3,155.00 to \$10,476.00 per year.

Eligible first-time domestic students are entitled to one year of free fees.

International student tuition fees

Fees can range from approximately \$16,000.00 to \$42,831.00 per year.

Other fees students may have to pay

- Compulsory Student Services fee \$790.40 for 120 points
- Building Levy fee \$77.52 for 120 points
- Additional fees for course materials or elective courses

Fees-free study

Eligible students starting tertiary education receive one year of full-time study fees-free.

If the student:

- Is a New Zealand citizen (which includes those from the Cook Islands, Niue and Tokelau): or
- Is an Australian or New Zealand resident who has lived in New Zealand for at least three years while holding a residence class visa; or
- Is a New Zealand resettled refugee

And

- Was enrolled at school during or after 2017 but isn't currently enrolled; or
- Hasn't previously undertaken tertiary study of more than 60 credits (equivalent to half a year full-time) at NZQF level 3 or above, except while they were at school

Included in the free fees are all compulsory fees (tuition, services etc) up to \$12,000 and tertiary study at any level. The policy will cover one year's study which is usually 1 EFTS/120 credits or points.


