A graduate of the **Master of Clinical Practice (Midwifery)** will be able to:

- i. Engage in reflexive practice to promote kawa whakaruruhau cultural safety, showing ongoing commitment to professional development and leading professional education to ensure contemporary practice as kahu pōkai midwives.
- j. Respond to the diverse health needs of whānau, including sexual and reproductive health care, appreciating the importance of ongoing education to ensure contemporary practice as kahu pōkai midwives.
