

Disability and Health

Master of Health Science, Master of Health Practice, Master of Public Health, Postgraduate Certificate in Health Science, Postgraduate Diploma in Health Science, Postgraduate Diploma in Public Health, Bachelor of Health Science (Honours). Am I eligible to enrol in this course?

This paper is for health professionals who meet the entry criteria for enrolment into the Postgraduate Certificate, the Postgraduate Diploma, or the Master programmes. The paper caters for people from a variety of health and health related professions, such as physiotherapists, occupational therapists, podiatrists, nurses, paramedics, sport and exercise practitioners, physiologists, doctors, osteopaths, oral health professionals, psychologists, and social workers. We also have students taking public health pathways from a variety of backgrounds.

What is this course about?

Develops a critical understanding of theories, policies and practices that influence the provision of health services to disabled people in New Zealand and Internationally. Enables a critical analysis of health service provision and applies advanced understanding of disability theory and policy knowledge to health sector practice relevant to disabled people.

What can I expect to learn?

- Learning will focus on three areas:
 - theoretical concepts of disability;
 - disability rights and policy;
 - approaches to generating change in health services and health outcomes for disabled people
- Content will include:
 - Listening to disabled people talk about their experiences of health and healthcare in Aotearoa New Zealand
 - Discussion of different ways in which disability is understood and the impact of these different understandings in terms of health and access to services
 - o Analysis of international conventions, national legislation and local policy that relate to disability issues in the health context
 - o Exploration of approaches that support disabled people to have positive experiences and outcomes in our health services

How is this course taught?

Location: Distance **Teaching period:** Offered in Semester 2 only

Block course: Entirely online and very self-directed.

Teaching style: Resources and study guide available online. Opportunities for class discussions online.

How will I be assessed?

1. Portfolio of four writing tasks (1000 words each)
