

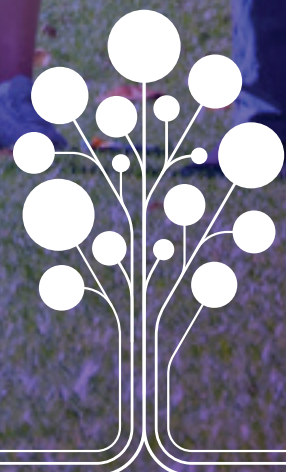

NEW PROGRAMME TO BENEFIT STUDENT NURSES

A transformative partnership between AUT and the Southern Cross Health Trust is making a profound difference in the lives of aspiring nurses. Proudly facilitated by the AUT Foundation, this collaboration led to the launch of the Southern Cross Nursing Scholarship Programme – a bold initiative designed to support student success and remove barriers to completing nursing studies.

The newly launched Southern Cross Nursing Scholarship Programme is a bold step forward in supporting student success. With more than \$300,000 committed in its first year, the programme offers both financial and practical support to nursing students, helping to remove barriers that often stand in the way of completing their studies.

Thanks to this partnership:

- 17 scholarships will be awarded to AUT nursing students for the 2025 academic year
- All first-year nursing students – more than 400 – will receive vouchers worth approximately \$300 to cover the cost of uniforms and shoes
- Scholarship recipients will receive a \$500 weekly stipend during clinical placements, easing financial pressure during one of the most demanding parts of their training
- Additional support includes course fee contributions, annual wellbeing grants and coverage of the Nursing Council registration exam

Beyond financial assistance, the programme offers priority clinical placements in Southern Cross hospitals, part-time work opportunities and a mentorship connection with graduate nurses, creating a holistic support system for students.

This initiative was co-designed by AUT and Southern Cross Health Trust, with input from AUT’s Heads of Nursing, Dr Jan Dewar and Dr Rachel Macdiarmid, who emphasised the importance of targeted support during clinical placements – a known pinch-point for many students.

“Helping students is our priority,” they said. “This programme delivers real, timely support where it’s needed most.”

Southern Cross Healthcare Chief Nursing Officer Monica Goldwater echoed this sentiment, highlighting the broader impact, “By investing in the future of nursing, we aim to grow the workforce and ensure our communities have access to the highest quality care.”

The AUT Foundation played a key role in bringing this partnership to life, aligning with our mission to accelerate impact through meaningful, sustainable and equitable partnerships. This programme exemplifies our purpose: removing barriers to education and nurturing future leaders who will apply their knowledge with purpose and compassion.

We are deeply grateful to our donors and partners whose support makes initiatives like this possible. Together, we are creating opportunities for transformative education and changing lives in the process.

SUPPORTING STUDENTS TOGETHER

THE 2024 STAFF CAMPAIGN FOR THE STUDENT SUPPORT FUND

The AUT Foundation proudly launched its second annual staff campaign for the Student Support Fund in September, reaffirming our commitment to helping students overcome financial hardship and succeed in their studies.

This initiative is a powerful expression of AUT’s values, ensuring that every student has the opportunity to thrive, regardless of their financial circumstances. With the rising cost of living, many students face challenges that extend beyond the classroom, including securing housing, affording groceries and balancing part-time work with full-time studies. The Student Support Fund exists to meet these needs head-on.

AUT Foundation fundraises to support this fund year-round, with over \$80,000 being raised in 2024 thanks to the generosity of our donors.

“We see students struggling with basic needs – rent, food, transport – and it affects their ability to attend class, complete placements and focus on their studies,” says Moth Sutherland-Tupp from AUT’s Student Hub.

“When we can offer support, it gives students a sense of safety and stability. That’s the difference this fund makes.”

STAFF CAMPAIGN HIGHLIGHTS

The campaign kicked off in September with Coffee Hour events across AUT’s three campuses, bringing staff together in support of the cause:

- South Campus:
40 coffees served | \$417 raised
- City Campus:
81 coffees served | \$1,084 raised
- North Campus:
48 coffees served | \$394 raised

These events raised a total of \$1,895, contributing to an overall campaign total of \$4,225 since launch.

We also welcomed 11 new payroll donors, bringing our total of regular payroll givers to 35 – a testament to the growing commitment among staff to support our students.

The AUT Foundation would like to acknowledge Chancellor Rob Campbell, who kicked off the campaign with a generous donation, setting the tone for a successful and impactful initiative.

UPGRADED GAIT LAB TO SUPPORT KIWI KIDS IN 2025

Celebrating a milestone: Lindsay Foundation Gait Lab reopens in 2025

The AUT Foundation is proud to announce the successful completion of fundraising for the full refurbishment and upgrade of the Lindsay Foundation Gait Lab, located at the AUT North Campus. Thanks to the generosity of our donors – including a major gift from The Lindsay Foundation – the lab reopened in 2025, better equipped than ever to support tamariki and rangatahi across Aotearoa.

Known as the AUT Gait Lab, the facility has been renamed in recognition of the Lindsay Foundation’s significant contribution. This upgraded, state-of-the-art lab will continue its vital role as part of the National Clinical Gait Analysis Service, in partnership with Starship Child Health, providing advanced assessments for children and young people with complex walking issues.

Professor Peter McNair says the upgrade will have a direct impact on patient outcomes.

“As New Zealand’s only gait lab dedicated to children, this upgrade will allow us to deliver more precise and effective assessments. With advanced technology and improved facilities, we can better support young people with mobility challenges – improving their quality of life and enabling greater participation in everyday activities.”

Since its inception, the lab has helped hundreds of children with conditions like cerebral palsy, brain injuries and spinal cord impairments. Each year, over 100 children benefit from its gold-standard 3D gait analysis, which informs treatment and surgical decisions.

The refurbishment includes:

- A new 3D camera imaging system
- An extra-long pressure platform for enhanced gait analysis
- Upgraded clinical spaces to create a more welcoming and child-friendly environment



Rob Campbell, Chair of the AUT Foundation, says the support from donors has been transformative.

“The generosity of the Lindsay Foundation has enabled us to acquire cutting-edge technology that will directly improve patient outcomes. We are also deeply grateful to our community donors, including AUT staff, who contributed toys and resources to make the lab a more inviting space for young patients and their whānau.”

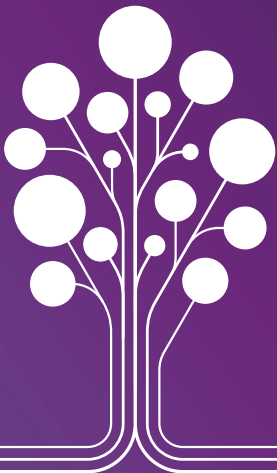
Brendan Lindsay, Trustee of the Lindsay Foundation, says the lab’s mission aligns perfectly with the foundation’s values.

The Lindsay Foundation Gait Lab reopened in 2025, continuing its mission to provide comprehensive assessments and tailored interventions for children with complex mobility needs. This achievement is a testament to what we can accomplish together – donors, partners, and the AUT community – when we unite around a shared vision of impact.



10 YEARS OF IMPACT: WOOLF FISHER FIRST-IN-FAMILY SCHOLARSHIPS

Ten years ago, the Woolf Fisher Trust made a transformative commitment to AUT – one that would go on to uplift generations of students, families and communities. In July 2014, Sir Noel Robinson shared the Trust’s vision:

“Like you and your team, we believe that [these scholarships] will help break the cycle within families for whom tertiary degree study is foreign territory.”

That vision became reality with the establishment of the Woolf Fisher First-in-Family AUT Scholarships, designed to support students from families with no history of degree-level study, and for whom university may be a challenge due to financial, cultural or social barriers.

Since 2014, the Woolf Fisher Trust has donated \$2.3 million, enabling 116 students to access a university education at AUT. These scholarships have not only opened doors to higher education, but they have also changed lives. AUT’s student body is among the most diverse in Aotearoa, with over half of the students now identifying as first-in-family learners. Many face significant parity gaps before they even begin their studies, and the effects of the pandemic have only deepened these challenges.

The Woolf Fisher Scholarships have helped bridge these gaps, reducing financial barriers, affirming belief in students’ potential and promoting social mobility. Over the past decade, 61 scholars have graduated with bachelor’s degrees and 31 more are currently completing their studies. These numbers reflect more than academic achievement – they represent generational change.

As one scholar, Fatu Ki Moana Mahe (2018), shared:

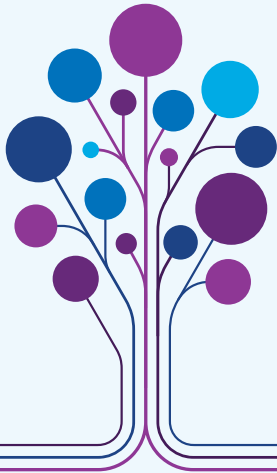
“When I received the scholarship, the first thing that came to my mind was that there’s someone out there that believes in someone as little as me.”

The Woolf Fisher Trust’s support has contributed to a more inclusive and equitable higher education system, strengthened communities, and helped build a more skilled and educated workforce. Even with support, university life – especially while balancing family and cultural responsibilities – can be challenging, and even more so in today’s financial climate. These scholarships have made a tangible difference.

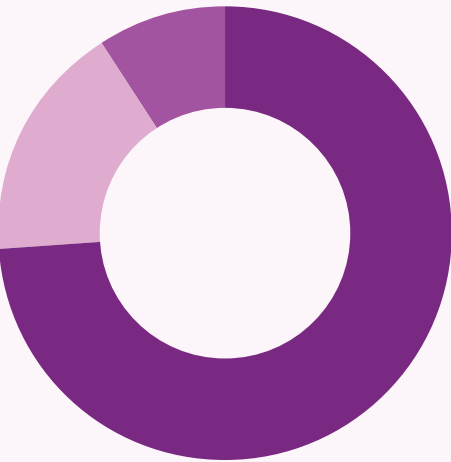

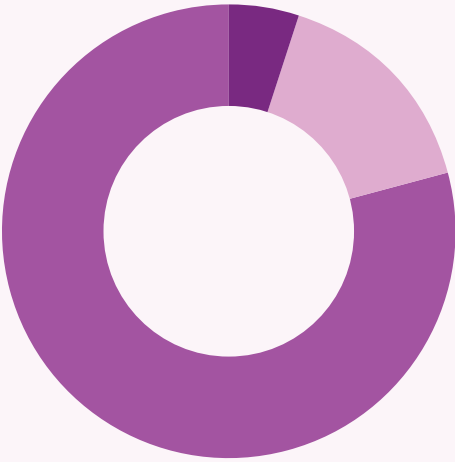
2024 GENEROSITY HIGHLIGHTS

OUR DONORS



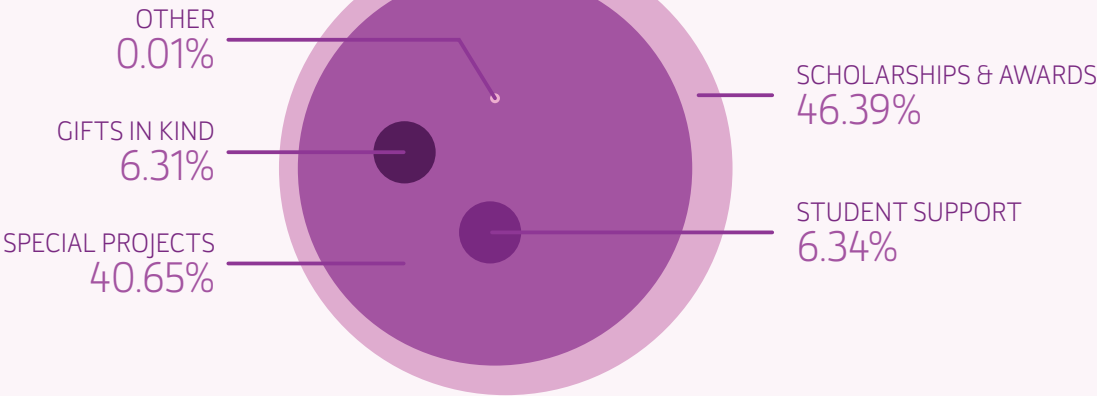
